QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION FOR POSITIVE ENDING

- What did Lilly notice when she saw Sarah?
- Would you see if some of your friends feels lonely?
- Did Lilly do the right thing when she asked Sarah to join her in the classroom?
- Would you like to be invited to hang out with a new group of friends?
- Was Sarah expecting to spend the day with Lilly and her friends?

SUGGESTIONS FOR ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

- Role-play "The invisible student": select one student (or a small group) to be "invisible" (others are instructed to ignore them). Have a normal classroom interaction for a few minutes while the "invisible" student tries to engage. Stop the activity and ask the "invisible" student how they felt. Discuss how exclusion affects others and brainstorm ways to be more inclusive.
