OBJECTIVES

- **to understand** the impact of bullying and develop empathy towards others who are different.
- to foster inclusivity and teamwork by helping others overcome challenges.
- **to improve** communication skills by practicing patience and understanding when interacting with someone with a speech difficulty.
- **to strengthen** emotional intelligence by identifying and responding to the emotions of others

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION FOR THE POSITIVE ENDING

- 1. Why do you think the pupils laughed at Nina when she was reciting the poem? How do you think that made her feel?
- 2. How did the pupils' actions change after Nina left the classroom? What do you think made them realise they needed to apologise?
- 3. If you were in the classroom that day, how would you have felt? What could you have done to help Nina?
- 4. Why is it important to be kind and patient with someone who has a stammer? How can we show more understanding to people who are different?
- 5. How did the pupils' support help Nina improve? Can you think of ways you could support a friend who might be struggling?

SUGGESTIONS FOR ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

- Role-Playing Activity: Pupils can act out a scenario where they
 help a friend who is struggling with a speech difficulty, practising
 kindness and support.
- Digital Quiz on Kindness: Use an online quiz or game (e.g., Kahoot!) that explores how we can show kindness and support to classmates.
- Online Storytelling Platform: Pupils can create and share their own stories on platforms like Storybird, focusing on themes of kindness.
- Word-Based Exercise: Create a word search or crossword with positive words related to friendship, support, and understanding.

Negative Ending

KEY CONCEPT/ DISADVANTAGE

OBJECTIVES

- **To understand** the consequences of bullying and the harm it causes to others.
- **To explore** the importance of taking responsibility for actions and the harm caused by ignoring others' feelings.
- **To develop** empathy by considering how Nina must have felt when she was ridiculed and left alone.
- **To foster** respect for diversity and difference by learning how to treat others with kindness, regardless of their challenges.

QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION FOR THE NEGATIVE ENDING

- 1. Why do you think the pupils continued to laugh at Nina even after she left the classroom?
- 2. How do you think Nina felt when no one went to look for her after she left?
- 3. What could the teacher have done differently to stop the bullying before it got worse?
- 4. How would you have felt if you were one of the pupils who laughed at Nina? What could you have done to make things better?
- 5. Do you think it's important to stand up for someone who is being bullied? Why?

FOR ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

- **Role-Playing Activity:** Pupils can role-play a scenario where they are the ones who witness bullying, practising how to step in and stand up for someone.
- **Digital Quiz on Bullying**: Use an online quiz or interactive game (e.g., Kahoot!) to help pupils identify bullying behavior.
